3. The challenges and dilemmas of data collection and evaluation
4. Ethical issues and social work values in research
6. Constructing a critical review of research evidence in a selected area of social work practice (linked to students' 3rd placement).
7. Developing data extraction and critical evaluation skills in relation to research evidence
8. Student led seminar sessions with tutor and peer feedback

## Learning Activities

Lectures will offer students a working knowledge of a range of research and evaluation methods with critical skills being developed in seminars. Whilst students are expected to work independently and develop their individual topic related to their placement, each student will be allocated a module tutor to support them through this process.

Students are expected to present material to their colleagues in the seminar presentations. Such seminars are designed to assist the student to develop their ideas and plan for evaluating social work practice, which will prepare them for their critical review. Tutor and peer feedback will be provided during the seminars.

The critical review is intended to provide the opportunity for students to write at greater length, exploring and critically using research evidence to reflect upon and evaluate social work practice.
