Aims and Outcomes

Aims	1. Introduce students to the politics of health by exploring different elements such as everyday provisions, drug formulations and testing and pandemics; as well as discussions on state and privatised systems.2. Develop an understanding of how health and politics are intertwined and the impact this has on provision and preparedness.3.
