Outline Syllabus

There will be initial lectures on the nature of research and its place in multidisciplinary studies. Consolidation of the key methods of research will be reviewed in line with areas covered on Level 2. Students will be introduced to a range of information retrieval strategies, including both primary and secondary sources.

Students will be invited to discuss any issues, concerns, questions relating to research generally, or their particular research topic, with a number of invited 'guests' who have demonstrated their research abilities from undergraduate through to post doctoral level; these 'open forums' will enable students to better understand the range of research experiences from a variety of practitioners' perspectives.

Students will be presented with a variety of models of interdisciplinary research from lectures in different disciplines. They will be required to articulate and justify an appropriate research question/set of clear objectives

Students will be encouraged to review their ongoing reflective log, considering, amongst other things, their academic and pastoral progress, strengths, weaknesses, research into career aims and/or higher study facilitated by tutor/s. They will consolidate this review in the light of the early development of their research interests.

Learning Activities

Initial lectures, workshops, attendance of relevant guest speakers, independent study, one-to-one guidance/support.

Notes

The aim of this module is to encourage students to consider the wide range of practical and academic issues relating to the process of research at undergraduate level. The differences between a dissertation and a project will be reviewed and students will be guided as to how to locate their research ideas within a cultural studies context. The key methods of research will be consolidated, as will the different types of primary and secondary sources and an overview of the strategies available for analyzing data.

There will be an opportunity for students to meet with lecturers who will share with you their experiences of research - how they decided upon their final 'title', how they practically conducted their research, dealt with unexpected problems, overcame a multitude of challenges and hopefully, offer any insight which will positively enhance your experience of research.

The resulting assessment for this module based on the work prepared throughout the semester, will eventually contribute to the final dissertation/project. There will also be a consolidation of eth reflective practice log that students have maintained since Year 1. Students will prepare their proposal which will be negotiated with an assigned supervisor. Time will be allowed within this module to practically undertake research, instigate communication with the nominated tutor who will then offer ongoing support, advice and guidance regarding the research topic and help map the way forward.
