Outline Syllabus

Public policy and political ideology. Policy and the public good. Political economy of events and tourism. Policy: constraints and opportunities. Public, private and third sector aims and rationales. Public/private partnerships and event production and funding. Events, power and social responsibility.

Learning Activities

The module will be delieved by means of lectures followed by workshops and/or seminars. Here students will participate in small group discussions based around material presented in the lectures using prescribed reading and case studies.

Notes

This module place the events industry within a wider political and ecomonic setting. Political ideologies will frame students' understanding of how events can be subject to varying economic opportunities and constraints. Rationales for public/private/third sector events production and management are explored and local and central government roles and responsibilities in event management are identified. Exploring interrelationships between events and wider policy aims allows students to contextualise events within a wider setting. Evidence from this module may contribute to WoW certification.
