Aims

The Performer focuses on the further development of the individual performer and their instrumental/vocal specialism.

The module aims to develop the conception, organisation, promotion, participation in

and presentation of several music performance projects to a professional standard.

Building upon and applying skills and technique in Level 4 and 5 modules, students are required to plan, execute and evaluate performance led projects over the course of the year, leading to a final performance

Learning Activities

The emphasis is firmly on self-directed learning and students are required to initiate a range of performance activities based on their personal strengths and career aspirations, which will be agreed through a performance plan.

Tutorials further enhance performance techniques and the development of personalised repertoire, including tutor attendance of rehearsals/studios, feedback and live performance/instrumental development sessions

* Weekly Lectures

Covering topics that support students in their activities throughout the module – see above.

- * Performances A range of student initiated performance activities will take place throughout the year with an opportunity to present a 40-minute final live performance in a formal assessment setting at The 2ubeXtra Festival

On-going performance activity will be recorded through a reflective Blog archiving of performance evidence generated such as video or recordings. It is the student's responsibility to share/invite your instrumental tutor/vocal coach to the blog, the blog represents an additional opportunity for formative feedback. Students are encouraged to work collaboratively with students across all courses and years recruiting and managing the appropriate student/musician, enabling project proposal aims to be achieved.
