A short series of introductory lectures covers the base of research methodologies and resources available, focused on the point of view of the creative popular theatre/performance artist, and will explore the usefulness of different research methods in analysing and developing our understanding of popular theatres/performance in general.

Subsequently, students will go on to develop an individual proposal for research that is both genre and discipline specific related to their personal practice, demonstrating their understanding and ability to use appropriate research methods in structuring their work. This may be related to the later Dissertation and Project module, but is not a requirement. This will be delivered through group seminar/workshops and individual tutorial.

This module introduces students to research methodologies for the study of all kinds of theatre and performance at Masters level. It engages students on this MA not only with a range of tutors but with students on other MA courses, fostering a postgraduate community. While the proposed idea is likely to evolve and may change over the course of Semester Two, the development of a practice-as-research proposal is the first stage in the conception of the thesis project.
