## **Aims**

This module provides students with the opportunity to develop a critical understanding of the range of theories, models, methods and approaches of assessment and intervention strategies used in social work. Students will be able to reflect on their values especially those that promote effective anti-oppressive practice as well as develop their practical skills in working directly with a range of service users.

## **Outline Syllabus**

- 1. Key psychological, sociological concepts and theories that inform social work concepts and principles
- 2. The role of research and research methods (local, national and international) in practice

- 5. Service user and carers perspectives
- 6. Managing professional practice
- 7. Developing a range of communication, interpersonal and inter professional skills in relation to the practice of social work.

## **Learning Activities**

This module will draw on a variety of teaching methods that will actively involve

students in the learning process. Teaching and learning strategies will include lectures, guided reading (provided prior to the module starting and during the module), seminars, role plays and the use of the skills suite/lab. Teaching sessions will include a short lecture introducing the required knowledge supported by the use of small group exercises. Some of the teaching sessions will assist students to consolidate learning that they have completed prior to attending the course and beginning the module.

The module uses three inter-linked assessment tasks, which are designed to provide students with the opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of the various theories and methods that are relevant to social work. The first task will involve students reflecting on their understanding of the nature of contemporary social work. This will provide formative feedback to the student within a month of the start of the programme. The second task is intended to enable students to develop and enhance their practice skills prior to going out on placement, this task will involve students completing a self assessment tool called the skills inventory. The third and final task provides students with the opportunity to develop their analytical and evaluative skills as well as their knowledge and understanding of service user perspectives.

#### **Notes**

This module makes links to the learning experiences students will gain on their first placement it is designed to enable students to develop a critical understanding of the knowledge, skills and values related to social work, by drawing on research evidence, relevant sociological and psychological theories, local, national and international perspectives on the practice of social work with a diverse range of service user groups.

Students will have the opportunity to learn, develop and formatively test their skills prior to undertaking their first practice placement.
