Notes

This module will provide an opportunity for review/revision of some of the material that has already been considered on previous modules. Ethical issues have also been raised throughout the programme, as relevant to the content of individual modules; at this point there will be a further review/reiteration of some core principles in ethical practice.

The module will also introduce students to a series of 'standpoint methodologies' employed in research including critical race theory, critical disability studies, feminist research and 'partnership research' with service users. The module will contribute to

students' understandings of how such theoretical frames impact upon all stages of the research process. The ethical issues out of which these 'standpoints' have emerged and the ethical implications of working within these standpoints will be discussed.

The module will provide an opportunity for students to talk about their dissertation research, the philosophical underpinnings of how they intend to proceed and a consideration of the ethical issues that their research will raise. These discussions will include consideration of insider/outsider issues in respect of research.
