Aims

1) to introduce and practice creative, formal, and technical skills appropriate to Writing at Masters level, in particular the techniques of contemporary writers and to relate that to their own writing.

2) to emphasise the importance of presenting work to professional standards and accuracy and editing to the writing process.

3) to identify and develop an original and creative voice as writers.

4) to initiate a comprehensive understanding of techniques applicable to research that enriches and advances their work.

5) to acquire a practical and analytical knowledge of writerly techniques sufficient to inform complex, creative composition and problem solving.

6) to demonstrate a critical awareness of critical theory and writerly commentary, especially that which shapes or generates current writing.

Outline Syllabus

During the module students will:

1) Consider published/performed work in a range of forms (poetry, prose fiction, drama and film), but with specific reference to set texts.

2. Analyse aspects of technique such as narrative, characterisation, structure, genre, style and point of view.

3. Focus on key aspect of the writing process such as keeping a writer's journal, generating new material and drafting.

4. Consider current modes such as metafiction, magic realism, the historical novel, and debates such as the tension between free verse and traditional poetic structure. 5. Discuss the work of theorists who have helped shaped our understanding of modern writing: e.g. Roland Barthes and Victor Shklovsky, as well as those practitioners who have meditated on the practice of writing such as John Gardner, Henry James, Eudora Welty, Seamus Heaney, David Mamet and others.

6. Be introduced to the experience of a post-graduate writers' workshop.

7. Continue writing.

8. Start to contextualize their own writing in relation to tradition and genre.

Learning Activities

Aims and outcomes are realised through lectures, workshops, tutorials, library visits,

the residences and visits from established writers and producers and expert tutors; wider reading and the habit of writing regularly and independently.

Notes

As the programme's first module, foundation is designed to introduce students to reading, writing, theory and practice at postgraduate level. There will normally be a

residential weekend near the beginning of the semester. As students will be encouraged to keep writing throughout the programme, several sessions of partsessions will focus on their own work. On these evenings the cohort is likely to be divided into two tutor-led workshop groups of twelve students each. Overall, the intention is to focus on relevant elements of form and theory whilst expecting the students to continue their own writing, thus allowing the module to be practitioner orientated.

In addition, students are encouraged to read six or seven chosen books from the recent year in publishing. These books will change from intake to intake, and information concerning them will be given in a dedicated handbook for those accepted on the course.
