3. to further an original and creative voice as writers by fostering close reading and constructive criticism in a workshop setting.

4. to develop a comprehensive understanding of techniques applicable to research that enriches and advances their work, in particular the importance of the drafting process.

5. to extend the student's range in the light of workshop experience and first semester study.

6. to demonstrate the importance of self-appraisal.

7. to emphasise the importance of self-presentation and oral skills in the writer's life.

- 2 Give and respond fruitfully to constructive criticism in a workshop setting.
- 3 Evaluate critically their progress and achievement in commentaries accompanying creative work in the light of (a) the first semester (b) their initial aims in writing the piece and (c) tutor and student comment.
- 4 Produce two pieces of writing in two different genres that show an awareness of techniques and conventions appropriate to those genres.
- 5 Present one's ideas fluently and cogently before an audience.

Outline Syllabus

1) At the beginning of the semester the cohort will be divided into three tutor-led groups (maximum eight). Each session will be structured round two submissions of student work, which will have been photocopied and distributed to the group in advance.

2) Detailed consideration will be given to accuracy, editing, appraising and presentation, and their importance to professional practice, and their importance in assessment.

3) Although it is anticipated that many students will wish to specialize as they progress towards their final portfolio, they will be required to submit two pieces of work in different genres to the Semester Two workshops.

4) On occasion the workshop groups will come together for a plenary session on technique, or for a visiting writer.

Learning Activities

Aims and outcomes are realised through lectures, workshops, tutorials, library visits, the residences and visits from established writers and producers and expert tutors; wider reading and the habit of writing regularly and independently.
