- 7 Demonstrate a critical understanding of drug actions, interactions and reactions and be able to analyse and apply this knowledge within the complexity of their clinical practice
- 8 Critically appraise and apply leadership and management theory whislt working as part of a multi-disciplinary pre-operative assessment team
- 9 Critically evaluate health promotion strategies, models of health education and promotion within the context of the pre-operative care setting.
