Outline Syllabus

- 1. Overview of research and debate in social work in relation to the nature and role of evaluation and research methods.
- 2. Review of some recent and classic social research methods and case studies of research related to social work, including practitioner research.
- 3. The problems and dilemmas of data collection and data analysis; using IT packages to aid data analysis.
- 4. Ethical issues and social work values in research: epistemology, moral and social theory;
- 5. Designing a research proposal for a Master's level dissertation: empirical and theoretical issues.

Learning Activities

The module will be delivered via a series of lectures which will help students develop and enhance their understanding of research methods gained from undergraduate study. These methods will be studied within the context of professional social work values and approaches. The lectures will be supported by directed study, small group seminars and individual supervision from dissertation supervisor. These activities aim to help students develop their understanding and apply their knowledge to the development of the research proposal for their study within the dissertation.

Notes

This module aims to develop and assess the knowledge of research methods, and understanding and transferable skills in the independent investigation, research, communication and evaluation of issues related to effective and ethical professional practice and policy. The module will provide feedback for students in relation to the development of the research proposal, this preparing them for the dissertation.
