To consider ethical issues in design, undertaking and reflecting on the research process;

Outline Syllabus

The dissertation represents the culmination of a student's academic effort and will be supported by a Supervisor, whose responsibility it is to guide the student through the process of planning and conducting research, analysing and interpreting data, and writing up the research in a critically reflective and philosophically reflexive fashion. Students will draw upon the skills developed in previous modules with regards academic referencing and ethical protocol (including application for ethical approval as appropriate).

Learning Activities

Tutorial support and independent study. Completion and submission of an application for ethical approval prior to carrying out empirical research activities will be supported by tutorial sessions and guidance.

Notes

The dissertation follows a long-year delivery pattern. Students will be encouraged to think about relevant issues relating to their dissertation at a point approximately half-way through the taught programme (following a progress review after the completion of three modules).
