Aims

In this complex environment this module will examine in depth, the key concepts in relation to terrorism. It will explore a number of key issues including definitions of terrorism, ideologies, typology, group structures, tactics, methods of operation, target selection, state response, use of technologies, funding and media impact.

A number of influential terrorist groups will also be studied which will provide the student with the opportunity of applying theory to practice. These groups might be

religiously-based groups, political and domestic extremist terrorist organisations.

The module will also explore the concept of and delivery of counter terrorism initiatives with a focus on the measures being adopted within the United Kingdom, drawing on comparative counter-terrorism strategies from the US and Canada.
