Aims

To enable experienced children's nurses to develop the ability to transfer their

existing skills and knowledge in order to provide safe, evidence-based, risk managed, holistic nursing care to children, young people and their families within the community context. In particular this will include children with acute and short term conditions; children with long term conditions; children with disabilities and complex conditions including those requiring continuing care and neonates and children with life-limiting illness, including those requiring palliative and end of life care. For the prescribing examination, the pass mark is 80% overall, and the numeracy component must be passed at 100%. Additionally, if any answers suggest risking the patient's health, the exam will be marked as a fail. The prescribing competences in the Practice Evidence Tool must also be passed. Students who already have a NMC prescribing qualification (V100, V150 or V300) will be exempt from the exam and the prescribing component of the Practice Evidence Tool
