Learning Activities

The students will benefit from a series of lectures and seminars relating to different areas of social work.

Blended learning (direct teaching and VLE) are key learning activities.

Students will be guided towards the essential independent study through the use of the virtual learning environment, reading and independent tasks in order build on and develop the theoretical base provided in the lectures. Students will be encouraged to monitor the media and identify policy and legislative changes as they take place.

Notes

In completing this module students will gain a firm understanding of the key pieces of legislation that are relevant to social work practice. They will be able to link social policy to the development of legislation, which in turn impacts on the rights of service users and current social work practice. The module includes an analysis of Human Rights, anti-discriminatory and equality legislation. The module will enable students to apply legislation to case studies and consider the tensions and dilemmas that arise as a result of compulsory social work intervention in the lives of service users, their families and carers.

Students will be able to evidence HCPC's SOPs and demonstrate their capabilities

as outlined in the Personal Capabilities Framework. This module is part of the learning that will ensure that students have reached the 'readiness for direct practice' level descriptor outlined in the Professional Capabilities Framework.
