This is an elective on the LPC as dictated by the relevant professional bodies. This module is also offered as a CPD - Details below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Programme code - 35989</li> <li>• Intake month - March</li> <li>• PSRB accreditation - This module was validated by the Solicitors Regulation Authority (SRA) in 2012.</li> <li>• Relevant subject benchmark statement(s) and other external reference points used to inform programme outcomes - The module is informed by the SRA "LPC Outcomes 2011" and by professional legal practice.</li> <li>• Mode and duration of study - 10 week part time course (excluding spring break and subsequent assessment)</li> <li>• Criteria for admission to the programme – Degree or equivalent professional experience (and ideally, a basic knowledge of leasehold tenure and civil litigation).
